

# Welcome to St. David's Lutheran Church!

We are blessed by your presence and honored that you have chosen to worship with us today. Please take a moment to sign the friendship sheet that is located in the booklet at the end of each pew, near the center aisle. These sheets will be collected with the offering.

**The Sacrament of Holy Communion** is offered to all who are baptized in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit and who recognize the Sacrament as the true body and blood of our Lord. Baptized children are also welcome to the Lord's table at St. David's with the guidance and consent of their parents or guardians.

**Prayer Requests** may be made by placing the request in the small wooden box at the rear, near the doors through which you entered. The acolyte will collect the requests and they will be included during the prayers of the congregation.

**For your comfort** there is a restroom and a water fountain located upstairs. Simply exit through the double doors back into the narthex. The restroom is straight ahead in the parlor, beside the grandfather clock, and the water fountain is to the right at the beginning of the hallway.

**Devotional** –Copies of Scripture readings for the month of December, Gospel Messages for Advent, Christ in Our Home (large print) devotions and The Word in Season devotions are located on the table in the back, next to the prayer box.

**For your convenience** there is a cry room for infants, equipped with changing table and supplies, a crib, rocking chairs, blankets, and toys. Simply exit through the double doors back into the narthex, turn right down the hallway, and it is the last room on the left.

## **INTRODUCTION**

The welcome of baptism is for all God's children. This baptismal gift sets us free from the power of sin and death. From worship we are sent on our baptismal mission: to serve the little ones of this world and to be a sign of God's merciful welcome.

All may make the sign of the cross, the sign marked at baptism, as the presiding minister begins.

and the sin of our own inaction,

injustice ignored, kindness not done, humility not shown.

Heal the wounds of our sin, forgive us, renew us, free us.

Let the power of your Holy Spirit reign over us,

for the sake of Jesus Christ our Lord.

# People of God:

# FIRST LESSON: Jeremiah 28:5-9

A reading from Jeremiah 28th chapter.

{Through a symbolic action, Jeremiah insisted that Judah and all the surrounding nations should submit to the king of Babylon. Hananiah contradicted Jeremiah, who in reply insisted that Hananiah's rosy prediction should not be believed until it came true. God confirmed the word of Jeremiah and sentenced the false prophet Hananiah to death (vv. 16-17).} <sup>5</sup>The prophet Jeremiah spoke to the prophet Hananiah in the presence of the priests and all the people who were standing in the house of the LORD; <sup>6</sup>and the prophet Jeremiah said, "Amen! May the LORD do so; may the LORD fulfill the words that you have prophesied, and bring back to this place from Babylon the vessels of the house of the LORD, and all the exiles. <sup>7</sup>But listen now to this word that I speak in your hearing and in the hearing of all the people. <sup>8</sup>The prophets who preceded you and me from ancient times prophesied war, famine, and pestilence against many countries and great kingdoms. <sup>9</sup>As for the prophet who prophesies peace, when the word of that prophet comes true, then it will be known that the LORD has truly sent the prophet."

# **SECOND LESSON: Romans 6:12-23**

A reading from Romans 6th chapter.

{Sin is an enslaving power that motivates us to live self-serving, disobedient lives. Sin's final payoff is death. We, however, have been set free from sin's slavery to live obediently under God's grace, whose end is the free gift of eternal life.}

<sup>12</sup>Do not let sin exercise dominion in your mortal bodies, to make you obey their passions. <sup>13</sup>No longer present your members to sin as instruments of wickedness, but present yourselves to God as those who have been brought from death to life, and present your members to God as instruments of righteousness. <sup>14</sup>For sin will have no dominion over you, since you are not under law but under grace.

<sup>15</sup>What then? Should we sin because we are not under law but under grace? By no means! <sup>16</sup>Do you not know that if you present yourselves to anyone as obedient slaves, you are slaves of the one whom you obey, either of sin, which leads to death, or of obedience, which leads to righteousness? <sup>17</sup>But thanks be to God that you, having once been slaves of sin, have become obedient from the heart to the form of teaching to which you were entrusted, <sup>18</sup>and that you, having been set free from sin, have become slaves of righteousness. <sup>19</sup>I am speaking in human terms because of your natural limitations. For just as you once presented your members as slaves to impurity and to greater and greater iniquity, so now present your members as slaves to righteousness for sanctification.

<sup>20</sup>When you were slaves of sin, you were free in regard to righteousness. <sup>21</sup>So what advantage did you then get from the things of which you now are ashamed? The end of those things is death. <sup>22</sup>But now that you have been freed from sin and enslaved to God, the advantage you get is sanctification. The end is eternal life. <sup>23</sup>For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord.

## GOSPEL: Matthew 10:40-42

The Holy Gospel according to St. Matthew the 10<sup>th</sup> chapter.

Glory to you, O Lord.

{When Jesus sends his disciples out as missionaries, he warns them of persecution and hardships they will face. He also promises to reward any who aid his followers and support their ministry.}

[Jesus said to the twelve:] <sup>40</sup>"Whoever welcomes you welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes the one who sent me. <sup>41</sup>Whoever welcomes a prophet in the name of a prophet will receive a prophet's reward; and whoever welcomes a righteous person in the name of a righteous person will receive the reward of the righteous; <sup>42</sup>and whoever gives even a cup of cold water to one of these little ones in the name of a disciple—truly I tell you, none of these will lose their reward."

#### PRAYERS OF INTERCESSION

For the president and prime minister (*these leaders may be prayed for by name*); for the congress and parliament: grant wisdom and hearts for justice, that all our people flourish. We pray for those in need. For those who seek jobs, shelter, food, health, and love; for dear ones known to us (*especially*): meet their need by your bountiful compassion and our community's action. Hear us, O God. **Your mercy is great.** 

We pray for all who worship you today. For wise elders and curious seekers, joyful spirits and burdened souls: give holy welcome, share tender mercies, and deepen trust in your goodness. Hear us, O God. **Your mercy is great.**Here other intercessions may be offered.

We give thanks for all who have died in the faith and received the reward of the righteous (*especially*). Bless their memory among us and their life with you. Hear us, O God. **Your mercy is great.** 

All these things, and whatever else you see that we need, we entrust to your care through Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

as grains scattered on the hillside become one bread, so let your Church be gathered from the ends of the earth, that all may be fed with the Bread of life, your Son our Lord.

Through him all glory and honor is yours, Almighty Father, with the Holy Spirit, in your holy Church, both now and forever. **Amen.**

# **Counting Words**

Count how many times the word *welcome* is repeated in this short gospel reading. It sticks out like a palm in the desert.

What does that word, welcome, mean to you? That you . . .

are gladly received?
may settle in?
belong?
are safe?
share in a loving community?
are wanted and necessary?
are not all by yourself?

There is, of course, the opposite of welcome: rejection. Earlier in this chapter of Matthew, when Jesus tells the disciples what to expect, he warns that those who proclaim and bring good news of the kingdom of heaven, those who choose the way of Jesus, will not always find a welcome for themselves or for their good news. Disciples may discover that they are . . .

turned away.

homeless.

excluded or banned.

vulnerable.

friendless.

shunned or not needed.

alone.

Count another word: *whoever*. It's as wondrous as a palm in the desert. It means no one is excluded and anyone is included! Jesus binds the words *whoever* and *welcome* together.

Good news from Jesus is nearly always surprising and predictably countercultural. Miracles and parables, what he does and says, catch his fans and foes off guard. The unlikely company Jesus keeps, the whoevers who welcome him, those he gathers in and sends out in his name, are shocked and are shockers!

Jesus' "who-can-believe-it?" good news means that though we find ourselves rejected by those we thought or hoped would receive us, we may mercifully discover that we belong with ones we never imagined would embrace us. We may thankfully learn that we are secure with those who once scared us. We are wanted and needed among the beloved weak ones and there, with them, experience the gracious reward of life in the communion of saints and sinners whoever they or we may be.
